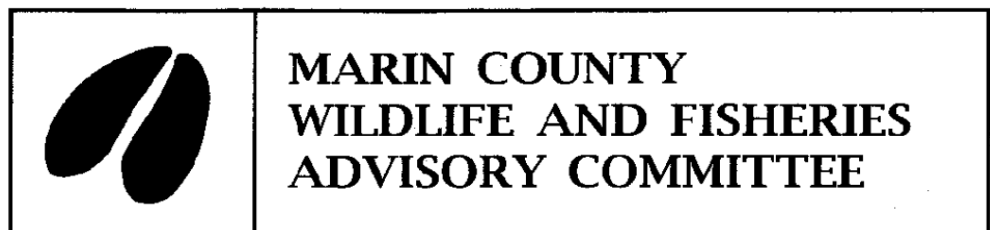


Marin County Wildlife and Fisheries Advisory Committee (MCWFAC)

Organization	Organization and Project Description	Amount Awarded
Richardson Bay Audubon Center and Sanctuary	Protects open space in Tiburon and provides nature education programs. The grant is for bird banding equipment.	\$1,500
Tiburon Peninsula Foundation	The grant request is for restoration efforts on Blackies Pasture.	\$1,200
Mill Valley Streamkeepers	The grant request is for newsletter production.	\$1,000
Point Reyes National Seashore Association	The grant request is for printing the 'Coastal Science Review' which informs the public about various science projects in the park.	\$1,750
Marin Audubon Society	Marin Audubon's educational activities focus on birds, other wildlife, and their habitats. The grant request is for native plants for the Simmons Slough project.	\$1,100
Friends of Corte Madera Creek	This organization is establishing a creek monitoring program for adults and school children to identify problem areas. The grant request is for water testing equipment.	\$1,500
Tomales Bay Association	The grant request is for straw, burlap, etc. to construct erosion control devices that are placed along creekbanks. This project continues every year with each seventh grade class conducting both science and art activities around the watershed.	\$1,000
Tyee Foundation	The Tyee Foundation annually raises salmon fingerlings in net pens in Tiburon. The grant request is for safety equipment for the net pen operation.	\$1,500
Wilderness Way	This program is a non-profit educational project focused on inspiring children to care for and understand watersheds and other natural resources. The grant request is for aquarium supplies to support classroom studies of steelhead salmon.	\$1,379
Point Reyes Dance Palace Nature Camp	Educational activities, art supplies, local field trips related to fish & wildlife in West Marin.	\$500
The Bay Institute	The Bay Institute restores and protects the SF Bay Estuary. The grant request is for protective gear and tools for children working on habitat restoration projects in the STRAW program.	\$1,481
S.P.A.W.N.	The Salmon Protection and Watershed Network works to protect endangered salmonids. The grant request is for support for annual mailings.	\$495
